



Famous Philatelists. The most famous philatelist of all was the late King George V. It was at the London Philatelic Exhibition in 1890 that the public first heard of the philatelic inclinations of Prince George as he was then, when the Duke Of Edinburgh opened the Exhibition and explained that his nephew was a keen collector. In 1893 Prince George, then know as the Duke of York, became Honorary Vice-President of the London Philatelic Society, and President three years later. When he ascended the throne he relinquished the Presidency of the Society and became its patron. His majesty was an active member of the Society and in 1904 he read to the memebers - Notes on the postal issues of the United Kingdom during the President reign.



PEARSON HILL

The earliest attempt at mechanised cancellation was a machine devised by Pearson Hill, son of Sir Rowland Hill, who began work on the problem in 1853 and by 1857 had constructed a machine which was given extended trials in London in September that year, also in February 1858. The Pearson Hill machine was operated by steam or a foot treadle and produced a distinctive double impression with the date inside sets of vertical lines. A later version had the name 'LONDON'around the foot. Both types of cancellation are exceedingly rare. In 1858-9 a new Hill machine, known as the Parallel Motion, was tested. This produced an impression similar to the contemporary double stamps. Experiments in Edinburgh with these machines produced the famous Brunswick STar Postmarks 1863-65. Parallel Motion machines were widely used in the British Isles till the turn of the century. Other (less successful) machines tested in late 1850 were invented by Charles Rideout and G H Creswell, both senior surveyors in the Post Office. All of these machines were hand operated, and purists tend to regard them as machanically assisted handstamps.


COACHING GLASSES

These are funnel-shaped glasses about 5 inches high, cut in flutes, but in place of the usual foot, have a simple rounded or a decorated knob. They can only stand upside down.

On a coach arriving at an inn for a change of horses, a tray full of these glasses is brought out. The passengers each take one, and while holding it in their hand, it is filled by mine host from one of his various decanters. The glasses were emptied without delay, replaced upside down on the tray, and the coach rolled on.

The horses of stage and mail coaches were changed about every ten miles. If the change took place at a posting house between important towns, the time for the change of horses had, sometimes, been cut down to eighty seconds; consequently there was only time for a quick one.

These glasses are now rarely met with.





Stealing Foreign Stamps THE HERALD 1900

A CORRESPONDENT at Newark sends us the following note:-

"At the Newark Borough Police Court, on Monday (April 11) before the Colonel Nicolson and other Magistrates, two boys, Samuel Davis, aged fourteen, and Harold Brierley aged thirteen, were charged with stealing foreign stamps from Miss Gales staioners shop in Appleton Gate. "Miss Gale, in giving evidence stated the stamps were taken from a card in her window on the previous Saturday night while she was away from the shop. "Evidence was also given by PC Lord, who apprehended Brierley at twenty minutes past ten. He found the stamps on him. Davis when questioned said "Brierley took them and had them in his stocking". The Chairman said the magistrates would have to send the two boys to a reformatory school -Davis for three years and Brierly for three and a half years - and the parents would have to contribute towards their maintenance,"

Cartoonists and comics may have got a laugh out of it, but the fact that the postmen of Eltham in South London need a warden to keep ferocious dogs away is no laughing matter to the Post Office. They are now so worried about the problem that they have even considered 'arming' postmen and women with electronic devices to deter dangerous dogs. "It's a great joke if you don't have to actually come across this hazard in your ordinary working day" said the Post Office, "But we are now faced with a problem that is growing by five per cent each year". In 1977 there were close on 4,000 cases of dogs attacking postmen and women. In March this year, the figure had risen to nearly 5,500 attacks. The cost to the Post Office for these 'wounds' can work out at £½ million a year in sick leave and arranging for a collegue to cover for the injured person. "The only way we can get round the problem at present is to inconvenience miscreants. First there is a warning letter, then visit by Post Office officials. If that doesn't work, we tell the dog owners that deliveries to their doorstep will cease if they insist on keeping the offending animal".

THE GUILDHALL POSTCARD

In 1889 it was felt that the 50th. anniversary of Uniform Penny Postage in this country should be commemorated in some suitable way. Co-operation between the Corporation of the City of London and the Post Office culminated in an exhibition held at the Guildhall between the 16th and 19th May 1890. A commemorative postcard was sold at a post office set up in the Guildhall, and a special handstamp was applied to these and official Post Office cards



Postmarks used at the Guildhall Exhibition come in two main types: Without code number or with code numbers from 1 to 12.










The Post Office Uniform.

The evolution of Post Office uniform is an interesting subject. It was Aberdeen, strange to relate, which first went to the expense of ordering its post into livery – it was to be a blue cloth with the arms of the town worked in silver on the right sleeve; this was in 1590. Two hundred years later red was chosen for postmen's uniform to signify the development of the service from the Royal couriers who conveyed the Kings dispatched. The scarlet piping on the modern uniform is the sole relic of this splendour. For some time only the upper part of the body was treated to uniform; the men were required to provide their own trousers, and one of the arguments put before the Treasury by the Postmaster – General of the day, Lord Walsingham, in seeking authority to spend £500 on these uniforms, was that they should make it easy to observe letter carriers if they frequented ale-houses or pawnbrokers shops when they ought to be delivering letters. Not unnaturally the letter carriers resisted the change as a reflection on their honesty, and moreover objected that s distinctive dress would single then out as persons probably in possession of large sums of money.
